Friends of KPL Bookstore Celebrates 25 Years



Nestled in the lower level of the Kalamazoo Public Library's Central location, the Friends of KPL (FKPL) Bookstore is stocked with thousands of gently used books, movies, and music. The bookstore is staffed by FKPL members and volunteers who are dedicated to

their mission of encouraging literacy and reading by making quality books available at very low prices.


Janice Snell has been involved with the bookstore since its inception and was the first manager. "Originally, the bookstore was going to take over the space vacated by the Kalamazoo Valley Museum during a planned renovation of Central Library. When the decision was made to completely remodel the library instead, the bookstore rented a space in the Prange building, which was located across the street from the library. Two years later, in 1998, the bookstore moved to its current location in the library's lower level. Many of our loyal customers still remember shopping with us during our early years at the Prange!"

Did you know that the funds raised by FKPL support KPL programming? In fact, since the bookstore has opened, FKPL has donated more than a million dollars helping to fund popular library programs such as the Summer Reading Challenge, Reading Together, Great Grown-Up Spelling Bee, Ready to Read, and Global Reading Challenge. FKPL has also funded scholarships for KPL staff for continuing education and program innovations. FKPL raises money through bookstore sales, monetary donations, and membership dues. You can help support their efforts by shopping the bookstore, becoming a member, or by making a donation. Visit their website at kpl.gov/friends to learn more.

Another way FKPL raises money is by hosting grand sale events. One of the most popular is the *Bag of Books* sale where customers may choose from thousands of books to fill a bag for \$3. "We typically have three *Bag of Books* sales annually and we hope to host our next one in June to coincide with the Art Fair and the Doo Dah Parade." said Janice Snell. Currently, FKPL is hosting its *Gift Book Sale* which began after Thanksgiving and will run until Christmas. Give your loved ones the gift of reading and purchase beautiful, like-new books at very low prices! Kalamazoo County and the Civil War Thursday, December 2 6:30-7:30 pm | CEN/Van Deusen

More than 3,000 Kalamazoo County men served in the Union forces during the Civil War. They fought in the most horrific battles from Blackburn's Ford to Appomattox, and 396 did not return home. The war tested the area not just on the battlefield but in its collective back yard and, at times, its front yard. A "peace rally" held by local Democrats was interrupted by Lincoln supporters who viewed the Democrats as traitors. Residents reacted jubilantly to the capture of Richmond, the Confederate capital, and mourned the assassination of Lincoln, who had visited the village of Kalamazoo before the war. As veterans, the former combatants left behind indelible reminders of their sacrifice. Author Gary L. Gibson will discuss his new book about the impact of the Civil War on Kalamazoo County.





Note from the Director

KPL is open and ready to serve you by offering the best in selection of books, movies, audios, and more. The pandemic did not slow down authors and creators and we have the latest from your favorites and so much more to newly discover at a branch or online. Digital content is abundant with great choices and availability through Overdrive, Hoopla, and Freegal. If you have yet to try KPL for ebooks or e-audios, give it a shot—and we are here to help introduce it to you! Just give us a call or use the Ask a Librarian feature at kpl.gov.

In-person programming is slowly yet safely returning to library locations with some superb activities in the lineup this winter, and be sure to check out the KPL Live options which offer the convenience of attending programs remotely.

Last year, the library fully closed for three months at the onset of the pandemic, then reopened with restrictions and reduced hours for five months—and then went curbside-only for another four months. As a result, patron visits decreased 75% from a typical year; however, overall circulation went down only 25%. That potentially reveals two things: 1) patrons took advantage of curbside and online services to access their library items, and 2) many of the visits to KPL locations that happen during a given year are for purposes other than checking out books and DVDs. Folks know the library is a place for gathering and studying, attending story times and programs, and accessing computers and wi-fi—but the library represents more than a physical place. The past year-plus has proven that our community can adapt to a virtual and online public library, yet it is also true that the magic and discovery found within pages of books must sometimes be hand-delivered face to face to folks and kids who may otherwise never visit a library building.

Library outreach into the community is vital for the promotion and encouragement of reading and improving literacy for all ages, and for introducing library services and resources to those who may be in need, or those who may face barriers visiting a building. KPL traditionally has done much to partner with organizations and schools in outreach efforts, and those efforts continue today in many ways including the reintroduction of a mobile library to serve patrons. So, as the library continues to rebound from the pandemic and welcomes patrons safely back to KPL, this public library here in Kalamazoo, Michigan is eager to once again serve all—at a branch, in a virtual environment, or by way of the new mobile library.
