Joint Statement from KPL and Douglass Community Association

Temporary Suspension of Services at the Alma Powell Branch

To the patrons of the Douglass Community Association and the Alma Powell Branch of KPI:

Kalamazoo Public Library (KPL) Board of Trustees made the decision to temporarily suspend services at the Alma Powell branch located within the Douglass Community Association (DCA). KPL held two public forums to answer questions regarding this decision and to hear from those who are impacted by this decision.

Both DCA and KPL listened to all comments and input from the community and are working together to see how both entities can safely meet their constituents' needs.

In the interim, the DCA will continue to provide youth and community services through its other tenants (Boys & Girls Club, the NAACP, The Great Lakes Center for Autism Treatment and Research, Helen Fox Music Academy and Loaves & Fishes).

KPL will provide, in the interim, supplemental services through additional Mobile Library stops, programming in partnership with DCA, the Boys and Girls Club and other library partners, temporary materials collections at partner locations and pop-up computer labs until a plan is finalized.

Sharing our love of books with our community

Is there a common Friends Bookstore customer type? Not really. There are as many reasons to visit the Friends Bookstore as there are books on the shelves located on the lower level of the Central Library. All our customers, however, do believe in the importance of sharing.

We see sharing everywhere in our community. All books for sale in the Friends Bookstore have been donated by members of the community and by the library itself. This allows Friends to offer more than 50 categories of non-fiction and fiction titles for children—from picture books to manga—to adults, including large print books. DVDs, CDs, and audio books are also for sale.

Many customers vividly recall visiting when they were younger with their parents or guardians. Now, they are sharing that love of books with their own children and also returning the favor by selecting books for their loved ones who might not be able travel to the bookstore.

Many teachers visit at the start of the school year for the reasonable prices Friends offers, to start their own in-room library to share with students. Local college students who have discovered our hidden gem bring their visiting loved ones—many from out of state— to stop by and shop. One local volunteer has made it his goal to share his love of reading by regularly providing books to the Kalamazoo County Juvenile Home.

Friends Bookstore is open four days a week and "Bag Sales" are scheduled twice a year. The next one is set for June 8, at the Central library location. Customers can share in the wonder of many books by filling a grocery-size bag with books for \$3. Learn more about this sale on our social media channels.

The bookstore itself exemplifies the notion of sharing by donating most of its profits to library programs and causes. Since the bookstore was opened 25 years ago, the Friends organization has donated more than \$1,000,000 to support library programs like the Summer Reading Challenge, Reading Together, Great Grown-Up Spelling Bee, Ready to Read, and the Global Reading Challenge. Come visit Friends Bookstore, and lets share our love of books together.



1 IN 8 KALAMAZOO RESIDENTS* FACE CHALLENGES WITH READING AND ADULT LITERACY.

Kalamazoo Public Library is hosting a community event in collaboration with reading role model Oliver James, known for chronicling his self-taught journey on TikTok of learning how to read as an adult. Since 2022, he has amassed over 301,000 followers and continues to grow every day.

James gained recognition for his efforts and was awarded the Barbara Bush National Honors Literacy Award by the American Library Association in 2023. He also successfully completed his personal goal of reading 100 books in the second year of his journey.

James's visit to Kalamazoo aims to draw attention to the widespread issue of illiteracy in the US. The library has partnered with James to educate the public about the relevance of illiteracy in our community and the various disadvantages it brings to social dynamics, mental health, and generational progress. Through our collaboration, the community will be introduced to several organizations already diligently working to empower adult readers and provide them with the confidence, dignity, and support needed to make a meaningful impact on illiteracy and inequity issues in Kalamazoo and the wider United States.







