



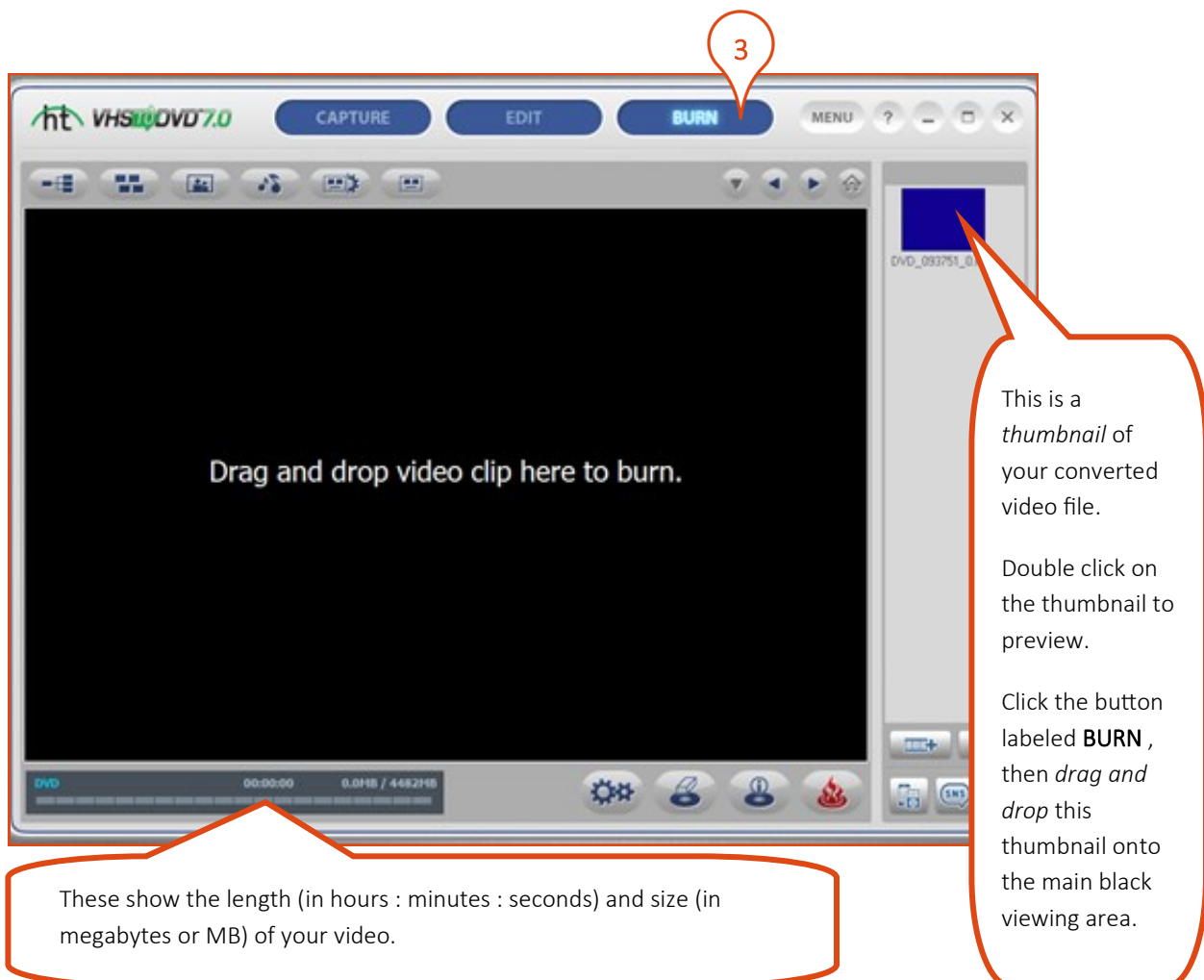
Burn a movie DVD

Using VHS to DVD

Use this guide to turn your digital files into a finished movie on a DVD using Honestech VHS to DVD 7.0 Deluxe. You will need a blank DVD-R or DVD-RW. It will take approximately 20 minutes to complete.

STEP ONE: Honestech VHS to DVD 7.0 Deluxe

1. After you have finished converting your VHS (see Hub Guide: Digitizing VHS Tapes Part I if you're unsure), you will see a thumbnail of your recorded video file on the right-hand pane of VHS to DVD.
2. *Optional:* To preview your recording, double click on the thumbnail. Windows Media Player will open with a preview of your recording.
3. Next, we will prepare your video file for copying to a DVD. Click **BURN**.
4. Drag and drop each video thumbnails into the main black box.



These show the length (in hours : minutes : seconds) and size (in megabytes or MB) of your video.

This is a *thumbnail* of your converted video file.

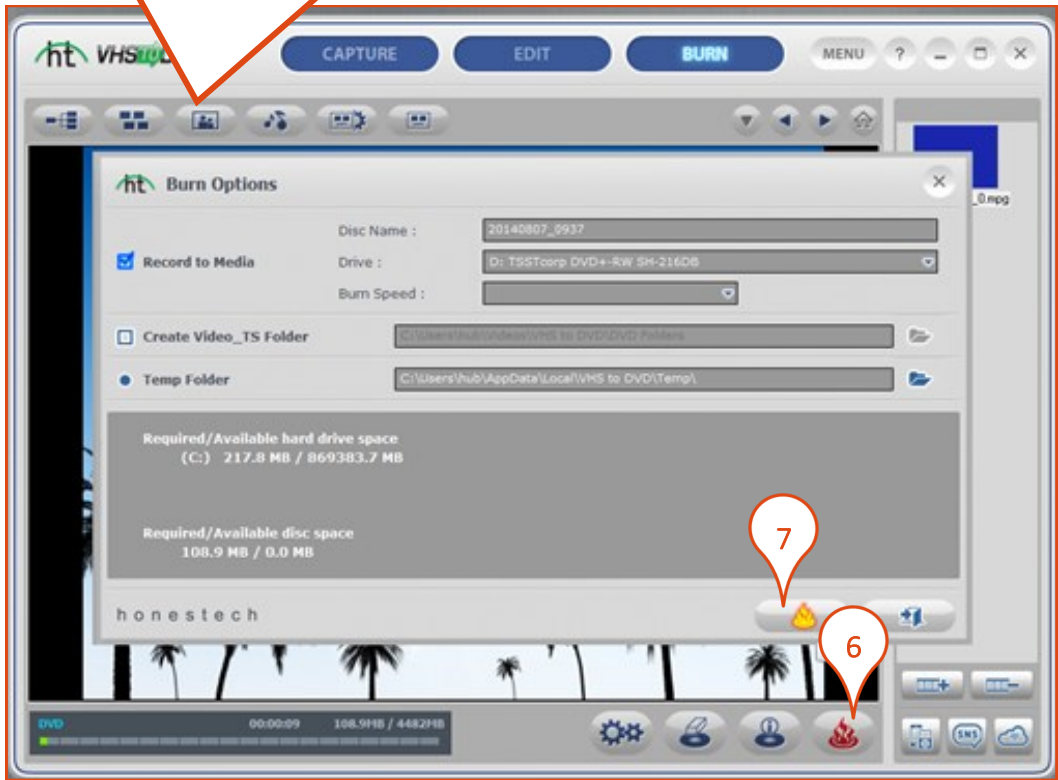
Double click on the thumbnail to preview.

Click the button labeled **BURN**, then *drag and drop* this thumbnail onto the main black viewing area.



5. *Optional:* What shows on your screen is what you will see when you put your finished DVD in a DVD player. You can customize this DVD menu by adding a title , changing the menu background photo, or choosing how your tracks will be displayed.
6. Insert a blank DVD into the computer’s DVD drive. Click the **Burn** icon.
7. A window titled “Burn Options” will appear. Click on the **Burn** .
8. A small dialogue box titled “Burn” will appear. If you are ready to burn the DVD, click **YES**.
9. Your DVD project should be complete in under 10 minutes! Thanks for using the Hub!

Click on these *icons* to customize the look of your DVD menu.



Glossary

Icon: A small picture that symbolizes a computer function. Most computer programs (like Microsoft Word, Internet Explorer) have icons that you can click to start the program. Other icons perform a function like turning on/off, muting volume, ejecting a USB drive, or burning a CD/DVD.

Thumbnail: A small picture that provides a preview of your file (documents, images, audio, video). Think of it as a book cover for multimedia.

Drag and drop: A common computer mouse gesture in which you move a file from one location to another location. Click, hold and release your file using the left mouse button.
